<p>Tuesday</p> <p>Math</p> <p>Encore: Library</p>	<p>Please select any book from the Ordinal Number Collection your teacher has assigned to you on Epic.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> After reading 1 selected book from EPIC, please play "Line It Up" -- students can use stuffed animals, cars, trains, legos, or any other objects that interests them. Start out with 10-17 objects (no more than 20), notebook paper (sticky notes if you have them) and something to write with. Have a family member line up your objects. Next, using your notebook paper or sticky notes write the ordinal position - 1st/First, 2nd/Second, 3rd/Third, etc. Make sure to write the number and word. Mix your papers so it is not in order and match it with the object in that ordinal position. Challenge yourself by playing with a family member. Have your family member call out random ordinal positions, and match.
